



The San Francisquito Creek Joint Powers Authority (SFCJPA) was formed in 1999 after a serious flooding event in 1998. The SFCJPA leads projects that mitigate the risk of flooding along the San Francisquito Creek and the Bay. The SFCJPA is made up of the cities of East Palo Alto, Palo Alto, Menlo Park, and the San Mateo County Flooding and Sea Level Resiliency District and the Santa Clara Valley Water District

Project Updates

Reach 2 Project Update

Save the date! October 25, 2021 Project Update Public Meeting -

The SFCJPA is collaborating with the US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) for the Reach 2 channel widening project elements. The USACE is leading on the National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA) review. As part of that review, we will be hosting a joint project update and public meeting on Monday, October 25, to update the community on the Reach 2 project and serve as a scoping meeting for the purposes of NEPA and the USACE process. We will distribute more information about this public meeting as details are confirmed. The meeting recording and materials will be posted to the SFCJPA website after the meeting.

SAFER Bay Project Update

Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) grant -

FEMA has identified the City of Menlo Park for a potential award of \$50M, which will fund a significant portion of the Menlo Park reaches of SAFER Bay Project. The City of Menlo Park plans to host a study session on this grant in October.

SAFER Bay Project CEQA Notice of Preparation -

We want your input! This fall, the SFCJPA will publish a Notice of Preparation (NOP) alerting agencies and community members that the SFCJPA plans to prepare an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) for the SAFER Bay project. It will be a programmatic EIR for SAFER Bay in East Palo Alto with project level evaluations for specific reaches. There will be many opportunities for community input and participation in the coming months.

FEMA Risk Rating 2.0 Webinar

On August 24, the SFCJPA, its member agencies and community partners hosted a webinar on FEMA's new Risk Rating 2.0. FEMA is updating the National Flood Insurance Program's (NFIP) risk rating methodology based on industry best practices.
